Therefore, economic emancipation through creation and support to women business enteprises, is one area of focus as we seek to end poverty and socio-economic exclusion.

This event is thus another milestone in a string of achievements by women's movement, as we continue our long march to a truly democratic, non-sexist and prosperous South Africa. Even as we continue to face numerous social challenges, we get courage in knowing that some odds have been overcome. We become emboldened with each barrier we break in the advancement of women.

We gain courage with each business success we record in different sectors of economy. Many companies have been started by women and there are making significant impact in sectors like manufacturing, financial services, mining, information communication and technology, aviation and healthcare. There are other successes being achieved by women that we must celebrate in academia, science and technology, arts, and in international inter-governmental organisations.

None should dare forget that no so long ago, South Africa was a pariah among nations of the world. We were a country in isolation and thus denied our full contribution to the advancement of humanity in important areas like trade, cultural, educational and sporting exchanges. We had to rebuild our fraternal relations with our neighbours and the entire world. It was also a framework that reinforced a view that our prosperity as a nation, indeed lies in mutual cooperation with our neighbours and other nations of the world.

There could thus be no deserving recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award than this daughter of the soil, who in her time as Minister tasked with our foreign policy, ensured that our country gains international reputation as a symbol of peace and democratic governance. In the process, business opportunities opened up globally for a number of South African companies. Her efforts in promoting an image of a South Africa that is stable, well governed and at peace with itself, positioned our country as a preferred destination for tourism, trade and investment. Many business opportunities and new markets for exports of our goods, began to open up and not only for big corporates but for small and medium enterpises as well.

Her elevation to the top post in the corridors of the African union in Addis Ababa, has brought much elevated respect for our own resolutions as the African continent on how we govern our affairs. She has brought stability to the administration of the African Union and championed a roadmap to the full integration of the Continent.

We applaud initiatives by Department of Trade and Industry and the Department of Small and Business Development for supporting small and medium enterprises owned in particular by women business. The exposure of these businesses to international markets, not only creates new markets for their goods and services, but also ensures that further opportunities for other aspiring entrepreneurs are opened in the value chain of business development.

We remain determined to ensure that as part of growing our economy, necessary support is given by government to women enterprises. This will ensure that the success rate of new businesses that are created by entrepreneurs, do not fail at infancy. We thank Minister Zulu and her department for this initiative to honour these women for their contribution to the health of our economy and efforts to create sustainable jobs.

We congratulate all those being honoured tonight, and are hopeful that their success will inspire other to pursue their dreams. We wish them continued success that will lead to their enterprises reaching global corporate heights.
